

### Autobiographical Sketch of S.P WETSAH

#### 1. THE FOUNDER- ORGANISER

I was born on May (most probably on the 25<sup>th</sup> May 1931) to Mr. Kekhwetso and Zutsonyi-u Wetsah at Chizami village of Phek district, Nagaland. Name Soyelo Wetsah, I came to be known also as S.P. Wetsah, especially for official purposes. I belong to a tribal community called Chakhesang. In the historical account of J.H. Hutton in his work, "The Angami Naga" the name of my native village is called Khezhabama. Some Angamis of my age or of older age refer to Chizami as Khezhabama.

I was born in a non-Christian family and was raised in such background till the age of 15 when I decided to become a Christian. Thanks to the broad mindedness of my parents I could join the lower primary school run in our village in 1940. However the school was closed in 1943 on account of the World War II, the effect of which did not spare Nagaland. The school came to be occupied by the Soldiers of the allied army. Then in 1944, the Japanese Imperial Army occupied the village and burned it down. This was followed by heavy air raids by the Allied Forces in attempt to flushed out the Japanese warriors. This led to the total destruction of the village.

In January 1945, a school was opened again in

which I got enrolled. When I became Christian in January 1945, I was banished from home. I lived like an orphaned would, till 1949. In the last part of October 1949, my parents became Christian themselves and we reunited as a family.

In 1951, I joined the government M.E. School in Pfutsero but discontinued in the event of my mother's death in 1952. Then in 1954, I joined the government High School, Kohimato resume my studies, when the Naga Freedom movement became more intense in 1956 and the Naga National Army occupied Kohima town, consequently cutting all means of communication. So I returned to my native village. The situation remained tense till 1957.

In January 1958, I was among the elderly and educated Nagas selected from various tribes by the government of India to meet the Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and President Dr. Rajendra Prasad. We met the former at his office as well as at his residence while the later at his office only. After returning home, I joined St. Anthony's at Shillong in February 1958. There I met the Assam Chief Minister B.P. Chaliha in October 1959. I was privileged to be chosen joint secretary of the Chakhesang Student Union for the tenure 1959-1960.

I discontinued my studies in 1960 and looked for ways to be a service to my community. In 1961, I married Kedu-u, daughter of Ethsulhi Lasuh. We decided to go where we felt our help would be needed. In November and December the same year I went and stayed in Mon town, asking elders where our presence and help would be most valuable. So one Loktun Waoshu advised me to go to Shangnyu, the oldest Konyak village, where people still live half naked, lived on wild fruits for sustenance and were still mighty head-hunters. However, the act of head-hunting was not done as openly as earlier days. The traditional chief "Angh" called Ato ruled the village.

On the third of January 1962 I set out from Chizami with my young wife, my sister Eyietsulo-u and one cousin Kedulhipe. We reached Mon-Tuesang district 5 days later. We started our works righ ways at Shagnyu village and seven other villages, which were , protected village of its Angh . They were Longpho, Ngasia , Zakhu , Sgangtin , Nogzan and Lapa . The village were on the borders of Arunachal Pradesh (Indis) and Burma (Mayanmar)

My wife work with a group of women on maternity and family welfare, village sanitation and child care, while my sister Eyietsulo-u worked at in a school. I got involved with village elders on administration, economic upliftmend and village welfare organisation

. At that point of time, the deaths were not buried: teophies of head hunting such as heads and hands of the slain were kept for decoration in the "Morungs" (boys dormitories) and the Anghs house,

Agricultural products were so meager because of which we organized the eight villages to start a farm in Tizit valley . On the appointed day, three thousand strong men from these villages reached the 250-300 acres of land and worked on it for four days consecutively . the effort resulted in clearing an 400-500 acres of virgin forest . However , the Government authorities beacem wary and suspicious of our motives because the Naga National Movement was very strong in other parts of the Naga-inhabited areas . My family and relatives were ordered to leave the place immediately and we did so within the following 24 hours .

Later, that same year, after the Christmas celebration, I was called to join the Naga Freedom Movement to which I agreed. In March 1963, I was elected the Joint Secretary of the Naga Army Organization, Federal Government of Nagaland. That very same year, when the Chief Minister of Nagaland P. Shilu Ao was in Chakhesang area, I asked the Adjutant General Makhen, Chairman of the Naga Army Organisation, if we should meet the former because he too was a Naga leader in anyway. My superior said it would be okay, and so I

made an arrangement to meet him at Chizami but failed to do so in final stage because the CRPF personals came to know about the arrangement and ensure that we could not meet Shilu Ao.

During my many journey as freedom fighter, I had been to (Bangladesh) then call East Pakistan, through Southern Manipur, Chin Hills and Chittagong Hills Tractin January 1964. After an intensive training in East Pakistan now Bangladesh for a short period, we started for and reached Nagaland in April. In the meantime, we learned that Rev. Michael Scott had already reached Kohima to broker peace between India and the Naga Freedom Fighters. Many consultative meetings were held after reaching Nagaland. Subsequently, being still very young and energetic, I was sent to Peace Camp Chedema, to bring some news to our camp.

On September 4,1964, Chizami my nativity, Enhulumi (also simultaneously called Pfutsemi or Yoseba then) village and Mesulumi village were burnt down by the CRPF Personal and many villagers were either tortured to death or shot dead by the same force.

In 1965, I was transferred to Civil section and sent to Hongking state as one minister (Kilonser) Advisor and Corresponding Secretary. Holding this very post, I traveled to Myanmar, Khiamnungan region, Konyak, Ao, Lotha, Sangtam, Yimchunger, Sumi (Sema), Angami, Poumai, Thangkhul and Zeliang regions besides others.

During these journeys I encountered orphans, children and women folk suffering and in need of help, care and protection. As mentioned in chapter 1, These encounters changed my perspective and mission of life for good.

#### 2. THE FOUNDER-ORGANISER'S FAMILY.

My wife Kedu-u and I have been blessed with five sons and one daughter. We live in the Nagaland Children Home campus at Diphupar, Dimapur. Our eldest son Rekhro (Sangkap Zangpai) born in 1962 at Sangnyu is married and is father of three children's.

Our daughter Wekhro-u is also married and is mother of four children. Our second son Jacob is also married and blessed with four Children. Our third son has finished graduation (M.DIV.) from Calcutta Bible College, Kolkota and is currently helping the Home Management. Our fourth son Kuthsolo is married and he is father of three children. Our youngest son Daniel graduated from university of pune.

We have also adopted three children. All girls, At present, the eldest name is Lhikolo-u is a student and is helping at home. The second named Rukewe-u has appeared HSLC. And third named Michille is a student of class 9.

#### 3. THE BEGINNING

he founding of the Nagaland Childrens Home was a result of prayers and many journeys I undertook in various Naga-inhabited place/areas during the 1960s. I was involved in the Naga Freedom movement with great conviction till so many encounters with helpless, starving and destitute fellow-Nagas who made me realized that my priority must be to look after such unfortunate fellow-beings. I could not stop it burnt like flame in my heart.

God made all human beings equal important in his sight. But humans became selfish and began to ignore the less fortunate. In the past, tribal communities had relatives to look after the destitute, but by the time the realization dawn upon me, I found the fatherless and the poor being neglected. Besides, there were so many people lost in the darkness of ignorance. I realized the truth of each person's responsibility to see to the survival of another fellow-being.

Consequently, with prayers in my heart, I left the

Naga Freedom movement to start a venture in the humanitarian service dedicated to the poor, destitute children and downtrodden women. This resulted in the formation of Nagaland Childrens' Home in 1972, with the motto, "LOVE TOWARDS HUMANITY".

The home got registered as a society under the Indian Society Act 1860 (Act XXI of 1860) bearing registration number 636 dated March 6, 1972, and under Nagaland first Amendment 1969 Act R.S. 78 dated November 28,1975. The Home also got registered under Foreign Contribution Registration Act, Ministry of Home Affairs FCRA number 164730004 dated February 11, 1985.

The Home as society formulated certain aims and objectives, some of which are stated below:-

- a) To render welfare service to the poor, the needy, the destitute and the orphans among the backward tribal people of North Eastern Indian states.
- b) To give educational and vocational trainings to the select target group mentioned above, to help them become self reliant and self supporting.
- c) To create a congenial atmosphere for physical, psychological, spiritual and moral growth through Christian education, subsequently making the beneficiaries responsible and faithful citizen of the country.

management of the Nagaland Childrens' Home has been devotedly working with the aforementioned objectives as priorities of the first order.

While I prepare myself and got to primary organizing, God moved the heart of the people. they began to support me morally and in every other possible way. The department of Social Security and Welfare, Government of Nagaland came to my rescue, and has been of so much help to the Home since then. Various Church Leaders and church organization became prayer partners throughout the world. Besides, many societies from India and abroad began aiding the Home in various ways. World Vision of India has been one of the strongest support.

#### 4. THE GROWTH OF THE HOME

It is with joy that I state that the Nagaland Children's Home has been growing from strength to strength and thanks to support and friends and well wishers in the form of prayers and contributions in kind and as well as cash. Over the years, the Home has been conducting various trainings for the benefit of the inmates.

Some features that will indicate the growth of the Home are enumerated below:-

- **SCHOOL EDUCATION:-** The management of the I. Home runs a school recognized by the Govt. of Nagaland. The school has classes from nursery to class-x.
- I am glad to state that ever since its inception, the II. HOSTEL:- The Home has hostel facilities for both

boys and girls, giving free accommodation, food 5. **SOME ACHIEVEMENTS.** and various trainings.

- III. AGRICULTURAL ACTIVITIES:-Agricultural activities are undertaken for the additional means of income to support the inmates at the Home. Such activities are conducted also with the intention to train them to have alternative source of income.
- IV. **FISHERIES:** The Home owns a few fishery ponds to train inmates in rearing fish and also to improve the diet of the inmates.
- DAIRY FARM: One Dairy Farm has been established for demonstration and to impart training classes to the inmates. The farm also generate and alternative source of income for the management of the Home.
- VI. WOMENWELFARE ACTIVITIES: The organization has also undertaken Woman Welfare Programmes, particularly for destitute woman and school dropouts. Vocational Trainings in Knitting, Weaving and Tailoring are imparted. Such trainings imparted solely for the tribal backwards and destitute woman of the North Eastern Region of India.
- **VII. PIGGERY:** The Home runs piggery to train the inmates to start their own or to supervise others when they leave the Home after being satisfactorily imparted with education.

So far, through the support of friends and wellwishers and through the trainings activities that have been held in the Home over the years, more than 3000 inmates have been benefited. Most among these beneficiaries have been nurtured and taught in the Home from their early childhood to late adolescent days. Besides the home today owns property both moveable and immovable. As mentioned in the previous chapter, The organization owns land, piggery, dairy farm, fisheries, paddy field, school buildings and hostel buildings, it is with great happiness that I give a brief account of what some inmates of the Home have become later in their lives. Nchogo (doctorate in Archeology) a western Rengma from Assam is now a lecturer in Govt. collage, Zunheboto, Nagaland University.

Masheto a Western Rengma from Assam finished his B.Com. and is now with Nagaland State Cooperative bank in Dimapur.

Kaikho Mao, a Mao Naga from Manipur state also finished his B.Com. And is now a cashier with Baroda Bank, Dimapur Branch.

Gyan Basumatery finished his M.A from N.E.H.U. and is serving as an Area Co-ordinator of World Vision of India, now pasturing in Methodist church, Guwahati.

Remha finished his B.Th. and is now working as a hostel Superintendent with World Vision of India in Arunachal Pradesh.

Wekose Lasuh from Chizami finished his graduation and has been the Superintendent of Nagaland Children's Home for the last few years.

Nuvolhu Chakhesang finished his M.A. and is now actively involved in the Nagaland State Politics.

Yato from Arunachal Pradesh is now an Evangelist.

Bigo Doke did his G.Th. Served as Pastor in Itanagar, Arunachal Pradesh, presently he is executive secretary, Adi Galo Baptist churches association.

Kholi Mao finished his graduation and is now a flourishing businessman in Small Scale Industries at Mao gate, Manipur.

Dr.Lokho is serving at Bethel hospital, Kohima.

There are so many others who are doing well in life today. But the account of such achievements will be stopped here owning to Time and space constraints. Hopefully, A booklet a lengthy account in the same matter will be brought out In the near future.

Since 1972, I have been through experiences that have enriched me and directly or indirectly contributed to the achievements of the Home. These experiences have been sources of encouragement, vision and further motivation for the tasks that lay ahead of me. I was encouraged and called to attend several meetings at regional as well as national levels. Some such ventures are narrated in the following lines.

I had the fortune to attend research trainings and consultation meetings in the field of public cooperation and child development at the national and international levels. The venues being Delhi, Kolkata, Chennai (Madras), Gangtok, Guwahati and Shillong. Being a founder member of the Family Planning Association if India, Nagaland Branch, I represented the same organization to Bhopal. I was member of the Nagaland State Social Welfare Advisory Board for five consecutive times since 1973, I was also a founding member of the Council of Child Welfare, Nagaland which led me to meeting various officers and political leaders such as Indira Gandhi, 22 Nov. 1975. Morarji Desai, Margeret Alva (Union Minister for Women Welfare and Child Development), P.K. Thungon (Union Deputy Minister for Supply and Rehabilitation), Ghulam Nabi Azad (M.P. Youth Congress President), R.C. Chiten Jamir (Member, Commission SC/ST, New Delhi, Dr. Badal Sen Gupta of Germany, Bon.

I have also been fortunate to visit Jerusalem and other places in the Holy Land, Rome City, Vatican, Los Angeles and California where I saw a home for the aged. All these experiences have encouraged me all the more to see to the achievements of the Home.

- 2. Bharat Excellence Award: The Friendship Forum of India (FFI) Presented Bharat Excellence Award to Mr. S.P.Wetsah "For his outstanding services achievement and contributions at a siminar on Economic growth & National Unity, at New Delhi.
- 3. Certificate of Honour in Service of Rural India: The Confideration of NGOs of Rural India conferred a certificate of Honour in the service of Rural India: SERVANT OF THE POOR to Shri. S.P.Wetsah, Dimapur, Nagaland on the occasion of the 3<sup>rd</sup> National meet of CNRI held during 25-27 April 2008 at New Delhi in recognition of "The sincere and Dedicated services rendered by him for the cause of the poor and the underprivileged of India." This award was conferred on the 25<sup>th</sup> april 2008 by Dr.Raghuvansh Prasad Singh, Hon'ble Union Minister for Rural Development.

S.P.Wetsah is currently the interim President of Federation of Indigenous and Tribal peoples in Asia (FITPA). The FITPA is recognized by the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous issues, division of social policy and development, department of economic and social affairs (UN).

#### 6. HOPE FOR THE FUTURE

The Nagaland Children's Home has been a source of great hope and joy to thousands of people, if the direct beneficiaries have been just more then 3,500 in the past. It continues to be a resort, which the needy, the poor and the destitute seek. It must, based on its aim and objectives, continue to b a source of hope to those in need no matter in whatever nature of needs.

Based on the achievement made so far by the Home, I expressed my genuine hope that it will continue to be a torchbearer for the destitute and others in dire plights. I believe that it will continue to be a channel of blessings.

It is also my statement of faith that friends and well-wishers will continue to support the Home through prayers, Moral encouragements and contributions in cash and kind. Such gesture will definitely keep the fire of hope burning, which is the sole reason for the existence of the Home.

he NAGALAND CHILDRENS' HOME is established in the year 1972 with 32 inmates, came from different parts of Nagaland. The founder late Mr.S.P. Wetsah and his wife Mrs. Keduzulo-u (Kedu-u) started the Home with faith in God, prayers and with the help of well-wishers who helped the Home in various ways. In the meantime many people came forward and extended helped physically, materially, spiritually, financially.

#### One of the many unforgettable events.

In the Nineteen seventies, A boy whose name was Mongolia (Nepali) was brought to the Home by late S.P. Wetsah himself from Dimapur Town with fractured/broken limbs. The boy never knew his parents and village. He was kept there for begging and crying. By then someone took his money. There was no one to take care of him, So late S.P. Wetsah enquired about the parents of the boy because there was no one to take care of the boy. He felt pity on him and brought him at NCH. The boy stayed for more than three years and died unfortunately.

## History of

## **CHRISTIAN MISSION HIGHER SECONDARY SCHOOL**

agaland Childrens' Home School was establish in the year 1972 with the motto "Love Towards Humanity" by Late Mr. S.P. Wetsah the proprietor of the school and later in 1973 it was recognized by Education Department, Directorate, Government of Nagaland.

The school which is a non – profit institute for the poor children from nursery stage upward. The school grounded in the biblical Christian faith is part and partial of the home. The projects strive to build lives which will reflect both culture and character to inspire a spirit of service which will honour and fear the creator of all and benefit the man, every child in the home shall compulsorily attend to his/her school education.

Nagaland Childrens' Home School was permitted to run class 9 in the academic year 1984 and class 10 in 1985 by Mr. K. Peseye (Director of Education Nagaland Kohima).

In the year 1991 January 16th the nomenclature

Nagaland Childrens' Home School was changed to Christian Mission School Diphupar with the motto "knowledge Love Serve".

And in the year 1993 March 15th class 9 and 10 was temporarily suspended due to unavoidable circumstances.

Later in 1998 to 2012 contract was given to Mr. V.J. Varkey for 15 years to run the school. It was a turning point for the institution. Under the headmastership of Mr. V.J. Varkey the school saw tremendous increase in its enrollment and also produced excellent result every year. The year 2006 can be marked as a year of blessings for it changed the fate of the school. It was when Ms. Aienla Longchar broke the record of the school by securing the top 7 with 88.50% in the HSLC examination result 2006. Since then, there was no turning back in bringing forth good result with good passed percentage of students every academic year.

In 2013, the family took over the institute and

was run by the youngest son of Late S.P. Wetsah Mr. Daniel Wetsah. On 1st May 2015 the school was upgraded to higher secondary level, Inaugurated by Shri Yitachu Parliamentary Secretary for School Education Government of Nagaland with Mr. Daniel Wetsah as the Administrator and Mr. Imti as the principal of the school. In 2017 Mr. Vibizo was appointed as the principal but due to ill health he was compelled to resign from his post in the same year.

Then in 2018 Mr. Pintu Bag who is the present principal was appointed.

The school had a humble beginning with only 32 inmates and 13 staffs with Khotuo Angami as the teacher-in-charged. But by the grace of our Almighty God, presently we have around 531 student's community and 30 teaching and non-teaching staffs in our school.



# MY EXPERIENCE IN NAGALAND CHILDREN HOME

was too young to understand the value of education when my father passed away early in my tender age; leaving a dozen siblings and a mother. I used to envy other children going to school, wearing new uniform and carrying colorful books every year. The chances of getting a decent education were bleak when the basic need of square meals was an everyday's struggle for my mother. Back in those days, there were hardly any organizations to help in meeting our family needs. But, my eldest brother's determination to give us basic education landed four of us; me, my younger brother and two nephews in Nagaland Children Home in the year 1985, where I spend my four years of childhood.

We struggled to get adjusted in the first initial months and even tried to run away several times; but, the authority patiently pursued us and kept us. As time passed by we learnt nagamese; made friends with fellow inmates and began to enjoy the "HOME" environment. The home was full of life! The first year was a fun year. The physical activities including



grazing grasses for cows feeds, exploring the vast

Diphupar A & B area with lots of open spaces and fields, the sugarcane cultivation, the village Rice mills, the roaring Sugar mill, the churches and the hamlets... were all spot on! A year on, I was promoted to the middle group, who assist the seniors in all activities and works. The seniors help and tutor the younger ones in studies and mentor them in other works. It was a short span of four years; but, very intense and formative years of my life and many fond memories of childhood to teenager!

NCH is a place where I developed my academic interest here. I was in my 3rd grade during a casual study time in the dormitory; Brother Jacob taught me Phonetic and eventually taught me how to read. He continued to be a big part of my learning for which I am always grateful to him. As I started reading, I developed a positive and competitive spirit in studies and tried to top the class in studies! The "study time,"

which were maintained very well and the "warden", who made sure that all the students do their lessons and are punctual; all these were a treasure to us, children and I was lucky to tap all I could from the teachers. Apart from my academics, I also got to learn practical tips, valuable arts and skills.

The spiritual activities were other memorable, enriching, enjoyable experiences and molded us immensely. The morning devotion; an evening dinner fellowship with lots of singing and prayers; the singing to the tune of Jim Reeves; children's favorite chorals; Bible memory recitation; the Lord's Prayer; preaching practices and prayers; all of them were PRICELESS! We used to attend Diphupar Chakesang Baptist Church, where our foster parents ( we fondly called Baba and Ama) used to attend. I got my water baptism from there, enjoyed 'Special Children Bible Camp' and got to participate in my first "Youth brigade" with undying memories of camping out, group discipline, the song and memory verse competition, Romans 12 etc. I was well fed spiritually while I was in NCH.

In 1988; I left the home due to my own personal reasons. But I carried with me the spiritual values I've learned from there, the enthusiasm in studies, the inspirations I caught and the zeal to achieve something in life. The period; 1985-88 were indeed very formative and significant years in my life.

I am grateful to God and the management of NCH for the positive feedings, the teachings to be a good student, the inculcation of spiritual values. The four year stay in the NCH was short; yet filled the gap in my childhood journey; the search of food, education and human love. Along the way, I got motivated towards medical studies and later choose to be a physician. # My brief testimony in NAGALAND CHILDREN HOME

xactly in 1975, far away from my home, there was an orphanage home, popularly known as 'Naga-■ land Children Home', which is a destitute home for fatherless and motherless children. Probably, this orphanage home was not only the foremost in Nagaland but entire country. I was then 8 years old in 1975 when my dad took me into this home in the month of January when winter was severely cold at night and left me for many years under the constant guidance, support, love and care from our godly send father late S.P.Wetsah and mother late Keduzulou Wetsah, founder and supervisor of this lovely home. Late S.P.Wetsah and his loving wife late **Keduzulou** was not an ordinary human beings but an extraordinary philanthropists walking on this earth. They have rendered selfless services and sacrifice their lives towards orphanage children in the North-East India. Their unfailing loving hearts and zeal never faltered despite of non-availability of fund from Govt., NGOs and individuals. Sometimes, our food provisions run dry but their faces never turned frown but always smile. Every morning and evening, our dining hall was

filled with hundreds children but we never slept without food for a single day.

Nagaland Childrens Home is not only a shelter for orphanage but an ideal educational and spiritual institution. I started my early formal educational journey from standard-2 onwards and learnt multi-disciplinary subjects from this institutional home. I studied in this home for seven pretty years (1975-81) with my great teachers to name a few like, Sir Paulos, Sir D.P.Singh, Sir Vechopra, Madam Nongbri etc. This home provides me not only food, clothing and shelter but builds my spiritual foundation through regular morning and evening chapel services. I learnt my Saviour Jesus Christ through the Bible messages and gospel songs in this home. I recollected the Bible messages and exhortation delivered by our father S.P.Wetsah, enthralled us through his powerful oratory speeches. Our father and mother often joined us in evening prayer meetings. At times, we used to be despair and frustrated in life but they enlightened us with their undaunted spirit from the gospel of Christ. Their miracle life testimony in the British Unadministered Areas (Eastern Nagas) exhorted and encouraged us to a large extent.

This home also provides co-curricular activities like, domestication of animals and rice cultivation. As an alumnus of Nagaland Childrens' Home, always love, dream and cherish this home forever. I have sweet memories about this home where we live together, play together, work together, eat together, study together and pray together. I was highly elated and appreciated to see the beauty of our **Baba** and **Ama** loves and affections, who treated us equally along with their own biological children. My biggest joy and happiness goes with their children who never ever misbehave or ill-treated us but regarded us as their own biological brothers and sisters. We lived under one roof with single family life's pattern, full of loves, compassions and affections from our Baba and **Ama**, which indicates their simplicity, selflessness, humbleness, purity of mind and thought.


Reminiscence of my long years stay in this home was re-captured to be just a single day life affairs. I really enjoyed staying and learning in this home as my own parental home. While I was studying in class II upto VIII standards, I was good in studies and received lots of love, affection, reputation not only from my great teachers and **Baba-Ama** but from all my brothers and sisters in the home. I was considered to be one of the brightest students in this home by our teachers, though in fact I was not; I recollected one day, Sir Vechopra, Headmaster, took me to Class- X room, and asked me to solve Al-

gebra on the board, so as to humiliate class-X students, while I was still in class-IV at that time, makes me unforgettable even to this day. He actually wanted to imply that an Algebra which can be easily solved by class-IV students cannot solve by class-X students. The magnitude of that spirit of studies haunted me and continues till my post-graduation and Ph.D research studies. This successful feat was possible through the blessings of our Baba-Ama and my great teachers in Nagaland Chil**dren Home**. In this auspicious Golden Jubilee occasion, I wished to see the faces of our **Baba-Arna** but very sad and unfortunately that both of them are no longer with us today.
